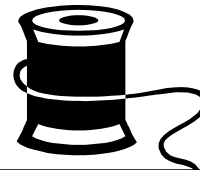

### **BHOG Library Book Reviews:**

Borders and bindings can seem like a bother after you've made 30 or 40 blocks. Here are two good reference books that might inspire you to put some more thought and effort into them.

#### **Borders & Finishing Touches 2, by Bonnie K. Browning. Library number 02-53B.**

This book asks: What does a border do for a quilt, and does yours even need one? The first 23 pages give good instructions on fitting borders, planning appliqué on them and options for corners. Finishing touches offered are piping, rickrack edge and prairie points. Browning says some quilts don't need bindings for wear or appearance's sake. Some alternatives: couched cording, raw-edge fusing, and even edging with zipper teeth.

The hands-on section features 10 quilts, made by other contributors that give good directions for a technique in the book. The very detailed table of contents is a really useful feature.

#### **Happy Endings: Finishing the Edges of Your Quilt, by Mimi Dietrich. Library number 04-14D.**

In contrast to Bonnie Browning's book (above), this one focuses on bindings and other edge finishes, with some basics about borders. Dietrich goes over layering the quilt for basting, and gives tips for figuring border yardage and using unusual fabrics.

Good illustrations will help you miter odd angles, do neat curves and do the inside points of scallops with less bulk. Hand-sewing the binding edge to the back is a critical final step, and the

author has firm ideas on what kind of thread and stitch to use and stitching down the miters.

One of the best hints in the book is a no-fail formula for a diagonal-seamed join on the ends of your binding. To find your subject in this book, go to the easy-to-scan single-page index in the back.

**Recipes:**

**Coconut Mounds Candy:**

Sift 5 cups powdered sugar, add 1 can Borden Eagle Brand Milk, ½ cup melted butter 1 box/bag flaked coconut, and 2 cups chopped walnuts. Chill for 3 hours until easier to work with, and then roll into balls the size of walnuts. Set in the refrigerator until firm.

In a double boiler, melt ½ bar paraffin wax, 1 cup chocolate chips (semi-sweet), and 6 plain Hershey Bars. Keep on the stove while using a spoon to dip the balls above and put on wax paper to set. Note: these keep better if refrigerated until serving. Enjoy!

### **Laurie's A Blessed Mystery:**

As I think back on all my blessings for the year—I can't help being thankful to belong to such a supportive, giving and fun guild. I also can't help but remember something Susan Mary Cee. was talking about at one Tuesday workday—it gave me a niggling idea which comes to fruition this year. She was talking about “blessing quilts” and how much love we pour into our projects.

If you are like me, and I'll bet you are, there is someone in your life going through a particularly hard time and you can't help thinking of them often and wishing all kinds of blessings for them. It may be a family member, friend or other quilter-- just someone going through an especially challenging time either spiritually, physically, or medically. It could be a friend with cancer, a family member who is out of work, or someone overwhelmed with depression, overwork or just a fellow quilter who has too many projects in the air and can't seem to finish one for the worry of three more (BEEN THERE, DONE THAT). There is someone you would wish special blessings for.

I would always rather buy an extra ¼ or ½ yard fabric to make sure I have enough to finish the quilt rather than run out in the last block. My stash has a growing multitude of little remnants and extras that I can't bear to throw out but aren't quite enough to do another project. Therefore, I have designed a mystery quilt with the help of EQ7 that encompasses these little leftovers and will make a blessing quilt in this New Year. I invite you to join me in more than wishing something special for a special friend.

This is very much a stash project---the only thing to buy or commit to is 2 yards of white, a neutral or black for the background in order to tie the quilt together. It will be composed of little steps that can be done over the next 9 months without too much time but the catch is every month we do something along with the quilt blocks. Grab your scraps, find a box or space to sit this project and come with me on a blessings journey!

The plan is to finish up in September so you have a chance to put it together and get it quilted in time to give that someone a special blessing memory at Christmas next year. Maybe we can have a showing at the Christmas party and then a hand delivers them or mails them to our “needy” person. Or if you can't think of someone in that shape just come along on a fun mystery project.

For January:

1. Pick a person.
2. Pick a background. This is planned to be about 60 inches square or a lap size.
3. From your background cut 3-4 6 ½ widths of the fabrics (WOF).  
Sub cut into approximately 20 to 24 6 ½ inch squares. Set aside.
4. Think of the things you want as blessings for your special someone.(i.e. health, love, faith, or a million other blessings that they may need.) Make a list on paper and keep it with your quilt as it grows.
5. As we go along keep in mind the following ongoing shapes: as your scraps accumulate or you sort them, cut leftovers into 2 1/2”, 3 ½” squares or triangles. that will fit into 6 ½ inch blocks (as the quilt itself is made of various completed blocks). Also randomly sew some scraps ( 1½ inches wide by 56 inches long strips) to use as an inner border or 2 ½ by 8 inch strips to use as a colorful binding. More on that later.

That t wasn't so hard, was it.

For February:

1. Take some of your 2 ½ inch squares and do some 4 patches. You'll need at least 50 of them total. They take such a little time to make . Remember there is no set color pattern on these—mix up your stash colors randomly. I will have a bunch of 2 ½ squares sitting by my machine and will start and stop other projects with a few 4 patches. Throw them in your box as finished. The kicker is that with each 4 patch you do, say a little prayer for that person. We can never have too many prayers—and at the end of each sewing spell say an extra prayer for yourself—you deserve it.
2. You also need to do sixteen 6 ½ inch stars this month in any simple pattern you want. We all know there are many simple patterns for stars out there. Use your favorites. The step with these is to call your person or someone to whom you owe a call with each star. Not hard, but something we don't do often enough.
